Proposed Legislation to count Observation in a hospital to count toward 3-day stay:

Proposed Legislation to remedy the Medicare "observation days in a hospital" has been introduced in Congress. The Improving Access to Medicare Coverage Act would require any time spent in a hospital to be counted toward the three-day stay requirement for Medicare Beneficiaries. In order for a Medicare patient to use their Medicare A benefits, they have to have a 3 day hospital stay. Hospitals are notorious for changing the "inpatient stay" to an "observation stay". Most providers have incurred bad debt write off's due to a hospital changing a patient's stay from "inpatient" to "observation". We will continue to monitor the progress of this bill.

Medicare Credit Balance Quarterly Reminder:

The Quarterly Medicare Credit Balance Report , (Form CMS-838) should be postmarked by April 30, 2019, for the quarter ending March 31, 2019. A Medicare credit balance is an amount determined to be refundable to the Medicare program for an improper or excess payment made to a provider because of patient billing or claims processing errors.

April 2019 updates to Nursing Home Compare:

Starting April 24, 2019 CMS will give providers a one-star staffing rating for providers that have four or more days in a quarter with no registered nurse in the building. The previous standard for RN coverage was seven days in a quarter. Please be aware of this change and the impact it can post on your overall rating. To see additional updates read article here.

Proposed Fiscal Year 2020 Payment and Policy Changes for Skilled Nursing Facilities:

CMS addresses updated payment rates and the quality programs for SNF's in the proposed rule issued on April 19, 2019. A 2.5% increase, SNF Value-Based Purchasing Program, and SNF Quality Reporting Programs are discussed in the proposed rule. Additionally, effective October 1, 2019, CMS will begin using a new case-mix model, PDPM, focusing on the patient's condition and care needs.
