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Dear Client,

Right now, your highest priority is the health of those you love and yourself. But if you have time to read about some non-medical but important matters related to the health crisis, here is a summary of items enacted to ease tax compliance burdens and economic pain caused by COVID-19.

Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Filing and Payment Deadlines Clarification

The IRS has provided answers to frequently asked questions (FAQs) on their website related to the federal income tax return filing and payment relief [Notice 2020-18](#) in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Some items to consider as of today include:

- Who is eligible for relief under the notice
- List of forms that have been postponed from April 15th to July 15th
- Must file extension for the postponed returns by July 15th to extend to October 15th
- Deadlines to contribute to individual IRAs, employer contributions to workplace-based retirement plans, HSA, and Archer MSAs have been postponed from April 15th to July 15th
- Normal filing and payment due dates continue to apply to estate and gift taxes
- Estimates due on April 15th are extended to July 15th (the second quarter estimates have not been extended)

Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA)

The FFCRA requires certain employers to provide their employees with paid sick leave and expanded family and medical leave for specified reasons related to COVID-19. These provisions will apply from April 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020. Each covered employer must post in a conspicuous place on its premises a notice of FFCRA requirements. Employers may be eligible for a 100% refundable credit against quarterly federal payroll tax deposits. Self-employed individuals may be eligible for a credit on their 2020 federal tax return. Major Tax Relief Included in Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act

The Senate reached agreement on the CARES Act stimulus bill last night which would provide several elements of temporary tax relief. The Act still needs House approval, so it is not final yet. More information on the CARES Act will be provided at a later date.
